The fees shall be determined by the examination centres. Expect to pay around 150 euros. Ads for the Cambridge CAE exam, called the Cambridge Advanced Certificate, are the penultimate Cambridge exam. This is a certificate generally accepted by UK universities on study programmes considered advanced. Like all Cambridge exams, cae has been approved/unapproved results and anyone who is deemed to have passed will receive a lifetime certificate. A CAE exam can be done both on paper and digitally, through a computer. In both versions, the total duration is 235 minutes. Exam structure Cae assesses the 4 competences – listening, reading, writing and oral expression – and is built as part 1 (90 minutes) – The first part of the CAE evaluates the understanding of reading, grammar and vocabulary. There are a total of 56 questions, divided into 8 subsections, and in multiple choice format, fill in the spaces and correspondence. There are about 3,500 words to read in this section of the CAE exam and all texts extracted from newspapers, magazines, books, advertisements or other authentic English writing forms. Part 2 (90 minutes) – The second part of the Cambridge Advanced Exam evaluates your writing ability. The student must write two texts, each with about 250 words. The first text is a dissertation in which the student must express his or her opinion on a particular subject. In the second, there are some format options to respond to the information displayed. Part 3 (40 minutes) - The third part of the CAE evaluates verbal understanding. Details from radio, television or other types of native dialogues and content-related issues are presented Each recording is repeated twice, and this section displays a total of 30 questions, divided into 4 subsections. Part 4 (15 minutes) - The last part of the CAE evaluates oral expression. The exam is conducted in 4 sub-workshops, where in the first two students take the exam individually and in the last two in pairs. This oral expression test can be done on another day for the rest of the stage of the CFE exam, depending on the schedule of the exam center. The second assessor is present in the room, only as an observer. Since 2016, all Cambridge exams have used a uniform scoring scale, however, each exam can receive a different score within the same scale, according to the English level to be tested. Students receiving 180 points or more should be passed the exam and given a Higher Education Certificate from Cambridge, which corresponds to cefr level C1. Students with 200 points or more will receive the Cambridge Advanced Certificate for level C2. Each Cambridge English Qualification targets a certain level of CEFR and works together to create an effective learning pathway. The first part is mandatory and involves writing an essay in response to an input text. The text may include articles, leaflets, notices and official or informal letters. In the second part, applicants must choose between three writing tasks. These may include writing a letter, suggestion, report or review. 3. Listening (about 40 minutes) The listener paper has 30 questions, which include listening to short extracts, a long monologue, an interview or discussion, and short monologues on a particular topic. Applicants are expected to present a wide range of listening skills for real life, such as the essence of the extract, understanding specific information or the opinions, attitudes or feelings of speakers. Recordings take the form of lectures, conversations, interviews, speeches and radio broadcasts. 4. Speech (15 minutes) The speech test will be done face-to-face (including the computerized version of the exam) and the standard format for two candidates and two examiners. One examiner acts as an interlocutor and assessor, contacting candidates and guiding the test. The other works as an evaluator and does not join the conversation. Candidates speak alone (monologue), with the interlocutor and the other candidate. Applicants are expected to present a range of speaking skills, such as pronunciation, tone, initiating and maintaining debate, organising ideas and using the right grammar and vocabulary. The talking paper consists of four parts. The first part includes a short exchange between each candidate and the interlocutor. The second part involves each candidate talking about the turn, on their own, about a series of images. In the third part, candidates are given some pictures and a task; they are expected to discuss the task, exchange ideas and make a decision by negotiation. In the fourth part of the examination, candidates and the interlocutor shall be invited to take part in the examination in the The interlocutor directs interaction by asking questions that encourage candidates to discuss issues more deeply than in previous parts of the test. In January 2015, Cambridge English Scale scores replaced the candidate profile and standardised scores used for pre-2015 results. All applicants (before and after 2015) will receive a profit and loss account and those who have scored quite high will also receive a certificate. The paper test and the computer examination shall be offered at the examination centres during the calendar year. All global test centres and their contact details can be found on the Cambridge Assessment English website. Successful applicants receive two documents: a profit and loss account and a certificate. Universities, employers and other organisations may require any of these documents as proof of their knowledge of English. The online profit and loss account is available for candidates who sat the computer exam two weeks after the exam, and candidates for the paper-based exam about four weeks after the exam. Successful candidates (who have scored more than 160 points on the Cambridge English scale) will receive a printed certificate within three months of the exam. Holders of the C1 Advanced certificate show a similar language ability to applicants who have an IELTS score of 6.5 to 8.0.
